What is commercial interior design?

Any building code-impacted interior environment requires commercial interior design. This includes all public spaces such as offices, schools, retail, hospitality, entertainment spaces...essentailly, anything that isn't a private residential interior. Interior design empasses the analysis, planning, design, documentation, and management of interior non-structural/non-seismic construction, and alteration projects in compliance with applicable building design and construction, fire, life-safety, and energy codes, standards, regulations, and guidelines for he purpose of obtaining a building permit, as allowed by law.

What do commercial interior designers do daily?

Everyday is different for interior designers! Much of this depends on what phase our projects are in. Some specific tasks that we do but, not limited to, developing floor plans, designing building interior's in 3D, designing branding graphics, and selecting interior building finishes and furnishings.


Our 5-Year Goal:


Our goal for 2027 is to advance legislation efforts for the profession of interior design in Ohio. After a state legisature passes a law that creates a title of "Registered Interior Designer" (RID), only those who have submitted the necessary education, experience, and examination to the state can call themselves a "RID". Sometimes these laws also allow RIDs to stamp and seal drawings for permits and/or bid on state projects. In some cases, registration is used interchangeably with certification. The IIDA OHKY chapter continually supports legislation efforts to advance the profession of interior design in both Ohio and Kentucky.


